#### YOUR RESPONSIBILITY

Once you are registered, you have a legal requirement to notify the Council of any changes to your residential, postal or work address within one month of the change. You can do this by logging into "My Profile" on the website.

#### Council's Responsibility

The primary responsibility of the Council is to protect the health and safety of the New Zealand public by ensuring practitioners registered in the professions of medical laboratory science, and anaesthetic technology are competent and fit to practise.

## Continuing Professional Development (CPD) – Medical Laboratory Scientist Practitioners

The Council recognises that throughout the course of the COVID-19 pandemic, practitioners are likely to have had difficulties accessing the usual channels and methods to undertake learning and development activities to meet their CPD requirements.

In recognition reduced opportunities for CPD during 2020 the Council has agreed that not to undertake a CPD audit for MLTs and MLPATs in 2021.

The new CPD requirements Medical Laboratory Scientist Practitioners apply from 1 January 2021. You can view this document here.

#### 2020 Audit – MLT and MLPAT

The 2020 audit of Medical Laboratory Technicians and Medical Laboratory Pre-Analytical Technicians is underway. The audit covers the CPD completed in 2019.

Practitioners selected for audit must send in their documentation by **Monday 13 July 2020**. Over 50% of those selected have already submitted their documents.

## Continuing Professional Development (CPD) – Anaesthetic Technicians

In recognition reduced opportunities for CPD during 2020 the Council has agreed not to undertake a CPD audit for AT's in 2021. The CPD requirements introduced for 2020 still apply.

The biennium will still run from 1 January 2020 to 31 December 2021. However, the Council will exercise leniency where a practitioner has not completed the minimum 40 CPD hours required.

### 2020 Audit - AT

The 2020 audit for the 1 January 2017 to 31 December 2019 is underway. The Council would like to thank those practitioners who have already submitted their documents and congratulate them on the standard of their portfolios.

Practitioners selected for the 2020 audit need to email their documentation to the Council by **Monday 13 July 2020.** 

# Timing of the Changes to the Continuing Professional Development Standards - Medical Laboratory Scientist Practitioners

The Council agreed to delay the implementation of the Continuing Professional Development (CPD) for Recertification of Medical Science Practitioner policy published in July 2019 until 2021. This delay allows time for providers to apply for approved providers status before 2021 and enable employers and practitioners to finalise agreements relating to meeting the costs of continuing professional development. The CPD for Recertification of Medical Science Practitioner policy has been updated with the new dates and republished on the Council's website.

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#### APC Fees

The Council has agreed there will be no fee increase for in 2021/22. For current fees please refer to the fee schedule.

There has been a change to the APC fees charged for practitioners returning to the workforce. In previous years, a practitioner returning to work after a break e.g. parental leave was required to pay the full APC. Starting this year, if a practitioner returns to work on or after 1 October a reduced fee will apply. Practitioners who are on parental leave are encouraged to delay renewing their APC until a week before they return to work.

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### **CPD Providers Accreditation**

The Council invites organisations offering CPD programmes to apply for accreditation. The requirements for accreditation are set out in the Council's policy "Standards for Accredited CPD Programme Providers".
